1. Freshman seminars will start this month.
2. Naviance (<https://connection.naviance.com/fc/signin.php?hsid=brookline>) is used as email system (e.g. in the process of preparing for college).

Mike (Michael) Normant (history teacher and advisor):

Introduction of the '**Ithaca** – as in finding your way home – **Advisory Program**'. Five goals:

1. Intro to the BHS culture: Communicate the culture of BHS, using mantras like "freedom and responsibility," "hard work over time," and "bring your best self to school every day."
2. Explore and appreciate our diversity and affirm the essential kinship we all share.
3. "making smart decisions" sessions. Reflect on the impact and meaning that your decisions as a teenager have on your life and those around you.
4. Instill citizenship / community service: for freshman this is a food / toy drive.
5. Strengthen relationships with adults in the building and community. An advisor (homeroom teacher): the same person throughout the four years of high school.

Homeroom is once a week for 45 min. There are 12 – 15 freshman assemblies per year. Topic of a recent assembly was the student government elections.

Q&A. Can you change advising groups? Generally, no. Only in exceptional circumstances, after administrative procedure, yes.

Adrian Mims (Dean) – refers to BHS Handbook where most of what he will talk about is summarized.

1. Handout Test Schedule: Teachers generally adhere to this schedule. If your child has more than 2 tests on a single day, you can contact homeroom advisor to find a solution / reschedule if needed.
2. Oct. 18: interim progress reports ('IPR's) will be distributed to each child. An email will go out to all parents at that time.
3. The beginning of freshman year is a time of adjustment, e.g. generally no retaking of tests, or getting points for making corrections, whereas that may have been the case in grade 8.
4. Contacting staff by email: **firstname_lastname@brookline.k12.ma.us**

Q&A with Dean Mims. (follow up questions asked after the meeting are in *italics*):

1. Can teachers give homework assignments over vacation break or a (religious) holiday? Teachers will generally avoid that, but need to cover the curriculum, so not cast in bronze.
2. Has there been any larger follow up to the screening last year of 'Race to Nowhere'? There is no specific 'larger follow up', but the teachers are more aware that the homework they assign individually adds up when combined with that of other teachers.
3. Will 'Race to Nowhere' be screened again? Don't know. Express your interest to the PTO.
4. Are mid-year exams cumulative? Yes, in most cases.
5. Does performance in 9th grade count for college? Dean Mims: No. Even though grades for 9th grade are made available to prospective colleges, BHS calculates a student's GPA based on grades in 10th and 11th grade. Grades are (only) a part. Recommendations are important, too.
6. Is there a guideline for the amount of homework? Average of three hours per night is a lot. (Is it?) Initiate a talk with guidance counselor if your child is overwhelmed with homework.
7. *Is it really 'that is fine' type of easy to go from standard to honors from one year to the next? It is easier than in the past, e.g. due to enrichment courses over the summer.*
8. When is the latest time that a teacher can give homework assignments for the next day? Can it be emailed or text'd *after* the end of school? Suggestion: by end of class. Be an example to the students for planning and organization.
9. How to deal with pressure to attend, rather than skip, athletic practice when homework needs attention? It is all about balance. If it is too much, consider intramurals.
10. *How / where can I / my child find more information about participating at the intramural level?*
11. **How to deal with absences** (e.g. for doctor's appointment)? Contact Ms. Sabrina_Macintosh@brookline.k12.ma.us (617-713-5190) as early as possible – can be days ahead – so she can enter it into the system.
12. Can you encourage faculty to be advisor for a club that is lacking student enrollment, case in point, the debate and speech club? Initiative and interest has to come from students, but yes, he will send out an email.

Mission Statement

The mission of the Brookline High School Guidance Department is to foster an environment in which all students are encouraged to become lifelong learners. By working with the same group of individuals over a four-year period, the counselors strive to nurture the healthy development of all students, acknowledging their individual and cultural uniqueness. The counselors work proactively to develop collaborative relationships with their counselees, their families and staff.

As advocates for their students, counselors focus on:

- Educational, college and career counseling
- Individual guidance and counseling
- Consultation with staff, families, and outside agencies
- Assessment, recommendations and referrals
- Developmental guidance curriculum and instruction



What Do School Counselors Do?

School counselors provide an array of services, including:

- Emotional, social, developmental, and behavioral support
- Academic advising and support
- College and career awareness, exploration, and planning
- Collaboration and coordination of resources within the school and the community
- Planning, implementation, and evaluation of a comprehensive developmental guidance and counseling program
- Consultations with parents, teachers, support staff, and administrators
- School crisis intervention
- Staff development and training

What Credentials Do School Counselors Hold?

School Counselors:

- Have earned a Master's Degree in a Counseling program
- Have passed a state mandated test for educators (MTEL)
- Received certification from the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education
- Earn annual professional development credits through graduate-level courses, conferences, and workshops

How Do Students Contact School Counselors?

Every student has an assigned counselor that remains with them throughout the four years of high school.

A student may contact a school counselor by:

- Student self-referral: Stopping by, leaving a note, emailing, or calling
- Teacher, Administrator, or staff referral
- Parent referral
- Peer referral

When Should I Contact My Counselor?

Counselors can help **STUDENTS** with:

- Academic concerns
- Social/ emotional problems
- Interpersonal conflicts
- Class scheduling
- Career exploration
- Post-secondary planning

Counselors can help **PARENTS** with:

- Concerns regarding academic performance
- Concerns regarding social and/or emotional well-being
- Special personal needs of students
- Coordinating meetings with teachers and other support personnel
- College, career, and post-secondary planning
