FROM THE INTERIM HEADMASTER

At the Halfway Mark

We are halfway through the school year, and the PTO has reached over two-thirds of its fundraising goal for 2011–2012. Thank you to all of the parents who made their donations in the fall. These early contributions create the foundation of our annual budget and allow us to allocate funding for programs and teacher grants effectively. Traditionally, one third of you prefer to donate after January. If you are one of those parents, now is your time! At this time of year, we ask our BHS teachers what little extras they would like from the PTO. Last year, teachers submitted funding requests amounting to more than \$20,000. At the time we were only able to fund \$13,000 of those requests. The 2011–2012 grants we funded included Kathryn Kantor Caruso’s wireless tablets for math; Liz Crane’s protein models for biology; Roger Grande’s development of primary sources for the 9th grade social studies’ curriculum; Eric Schiff and Alexandra Young’s overhaul of the Guidance Department website; Scott Butchart’s creation of a policy manual for the Scholarship Committee; Lynne Cohen’s summer reading books for the library; Bruce Mallory’s request for whiteboards for math; Betsy Davis and Leon Kestenbaum’s photography exhibit, documenting the experience of BHS’ international students; Michael Driscoll’s piano class curriculum development; Fran Kuehn’s supplies and materials for the Homework Center; Sarah Ladner’s cameras for Winthrop House; Kenny Kozol, Carolyn Castellano, Christien Polos, and Mike Driscoll’s guest artists for Musica y Cultura; Jim Henry’s start-up funds for the Intensive Learning

School Within a School Hosts Art Gala

The SWS "Put Your Money Where Your Mouth Is" (PYMWYMI) Committee is hosting its first-ever art gala to benefit Artists for Humanity, a local organization providing underserved youth with the keys to self-sufficiency through paid employment in the arts. The gala will be held on Thursday, February 9 at Brookline High School on the fourth floor. The event will start at 7 p.m. and end around 10 p.m. Admission is \$5 for students and \$10 for adults, and all proceeds will go to Artists for Humanity. Additionally, the gala will feature free refreshments and live music.

Students Explore Civil Rights History

About 50 years ago the Freedom Rides began, when groups of people of all races, ages, and hometowns headed for the American South to test the 1960 Supreme Court ruling that outlawed segregation in all interstate public facilities. The role of ordinary people in the historic civil rights struggle cannot be overstated.

During February break, 12 students from Brookline High School will be studying the civil rights movement in depth, visiting historic sites in the South and meeting some of its activists. Their coming trip was featured in the *Brookline Tab* last month.

Please join the students at an inspiring fundraiser on February 6 and have those electrifying days recalled. You will enjoy a three-course dinner while listening to a panel of speakers share their experiences in social justice:

- **Judith Frieze Wright**, one of the original Freedom Riders, was arrested in Mississippi and jailed for being in an interracial group in the bus station's "White-Only" waiting room. She later spent a

year helping with voter registration and anti-segregation demonstrations.

- **John Cawthorne** is an historian, educator, former dean at Boston College, and former VP of Education for the National Urban League.
- **Ruth Ellen Fitch** is an economist, educator, lawyer, former METCO director in the Brookline Public Schools, President and CEO of Dimock Community Health Center, and board member of the Boston Public Health Commission.

Proceeds from the dinner will finance the students on their 10-day trip, which was organized by *Sojourn to the Past* (recognized for its excellence by the Obama administration). Read more about the trip at <http://www.sojournproject.com/journey-details/>.

Brookline Health Department: *Nurses Notes*

There has been a recent outbreak of a gastrointestinal illness in the Greater Boston area. The following control measures are recommended by the Brookline Health Department and School Health Services.

To prevent the spread of the virus at school and home the following MUST be followed:

- DO NOT send your child to school or go to work if sick with symptoms of vomiting, nausea, stomachache, or diarrhea.
- Students may not return to school until 72 hours after their symptoms have stopped.
- All students and parents should wash their hands with warm soapy water or use hand sanitizers as soon as possible on entering the school building.
- Students should wash their hands before eating and after toileting.
- Any student who becomes sick in school will be sent home.
- Sick students should not attend any extracurricular activities, including sports.
- If your child is sick and unable to keep down fluids, call your PCP for recommendations about fluid replacement.
- If students or members of their household become sick with symptoms mentioned above, please call the school nurse and report symptoms.

Prescription Drug Abuse Prevention

The B-CASA Steering Committee meeting in January was highlighted by discussion of two main goals. This first was discussion of the organization's current, 10-year SAMHSA grant, which (until it runs out in September 2013) funds the vast majority of the group's efforts, including B-PEN (Brookline Parent Education Network), the Peer Leadership program, SADD (Students Against Destructive Decisions), and B-CASA's forums and presentations. The organization is currently in the process of evaluating how some of these programs are working and how successful initiatives can be sustained once the grant is complete.

The second goal was brainstorming ideas for the Prescription Drug Abuse Prevention Plan. Two major initiatives are underway. A "spring cleaning" awareness campaign involves the Drug Take Back Day and Peer Leader projects, including student presentations and PSA ads. An "informed consumer" campaign is geared toward helping parents and students understand the implications of prescribed medicines, addressing issues of overmedication and how it can feed into drug abuse. One idea underway is a checklist of questions to ask when medication is recommended.

For 20 years, the rollicking, substance-free, all-night ATPP has been the most memorable celebration of the year for BHS seniors, giving them a safe and fun alternative to the traditionally dangerous post-prom hours. Held in the Tappan Gym immediately following the June 5 prom, we need senior parents to have a unified voice about their kids attending ATPP to continue this town tradition.

The senior class chose the theme **CANDY LAND** for this year's ATPP. Remember the Candy Cane Forest and Gum Drop Mountain? How about Princess Frostine, Mr. Mint, and Gramma Nutt? It'll be a sweet ride for all.

To make this happen, the ATPP needs you! This event is truly an all-Brookline effort and welcomes volunteers from every facet of the community. With numerous committees (see below), there's a volunteer opportunity to match every talent, ability, and schedule—from those who pitch in once or twice to those who can fill a leadership position.

- The Prize Committee solicits donations of items to be raffled as prizes at the party. You need to be organized, comfortable asking for things, often more than once, and willing to follow up.
- The Food Committee arranges for the wide range of food offerings during the setup, breakdown, and the party itself as well as volunteers to work the food booths during the ATPP.
- The Setup and Breakdown Committee works the day of the party setting up the gym and the morning after the ATPP, beginning at 6:00 a.m., getting the space back in order.
- The Decoration Committee designs and creates the "Candy Land" themed decorations. This committee needs a leader.
- The Fundraising Committee sends out letters in the spring soliciting funds (using pre-sent templates and contact sheets), collecting and cataloguing donations. This committee also needs a leader.
- The Host Committee recruits non-senior parents who can help at the party, either for the whole night from midnight to 5:00 a.m. or in shifts from 11:30 p.m. to 2:30 a.m. and 2:30 to 5:00 a.m.
- The Green Committee works to acquire environmentally friendly dinner ware and set up a system for recycling and composting trash, making the ATPP not just fun but green!

Dating Violence Awareness

Did you know February is Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month? According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, one in eleven adolescents (as young as age 11) is a victim of physical dating violence, and one in five high school girls has been physically or sexually abused by a dating partner.

BHS Peer Leaders will be promoting awareness of these issues this month by distributing posters and buttons around the school and selling candy grams. Proceeds from the candy grams will be donated to the Jennifer A. Lynch Fund, an organization that raises money for domestic violence awareness and education programs in Brookline.

Ms. Norling, whose daughter Jennifer Lynch was tragically murdered by domestic violence in 2006, will give two presentations on February 9, discussing the issues and warning signs of domestic violence and the importance of prevention.
